# Letter from the **Executive Director**

2022 was a year of tremendous change, not only for our organization but also for the community we serve. Demand for our services, programs, expertise and leadership has never been higher. As Canada's only national organization supporting those whose lives are impacted by immunodeficiency, we understand the needs of that community and responded.

A new strategic plan was unveiled, setting strategic directives, goals and objectives for the next five years. This was closely followed by an organizational rebranding where the Canadian Immunodeficiencies Patient Organization became ImmUnity Canada. This brand change from CIPO to ImmUnity Canada was a long and thoughtful process, with engagement across our stakeholders.

We also undertook an organizational needs assessment to ensure that the programs and services we offer are relevant, evidence-based, and sustainable. This included a national membership survey, regional data gathering events and focused interviews.

While we worked internally to fortify the organization for success and sustainability, we continued to offer virtual programs and events. We held our first ever fundraising Walk for PI during World PI Week. Over 100 members joined and walked across Canada from their home. We also held our first virtual conference, a two-day event with over 250 registered participants.

New faces joined our forces with Fiona Coyle and Yaheli Serrano to oversee the volunteer program and administration, respectively.

On behalf of ImmUnity Canada I would like to commend all staff and volunteers for continuing to deliver core services and programs during the third year of the pandemic. I continue to be humbled by the passion and dedication of everyone involved and consider myself lucky to be able to lead them and this organization.

### Rebranding

In the 1990s, a Canadian with primary immunodeficiency (PI) wanting to connect with other patients found that a national organization representing PI didn't exist. So they made one.

ImmUnity Canada was founded in 1997 with help from the International Patient Organization for Primary Immunodeficiency (IPOPI). Initially known as the Canadian Immunodeficiency Patient Organization (CIPO), we invited patients and caregivers across the country to join and connect with fellow patients.

Early on, CIPO joined the Network for Rare Blood Disorders Organization (NRBDO). This pan-Canadian

coalition of patient organizations assists each other in governance and best practices. The NRBDO was vital in helping ImmUnity Canada establish by-laws and policies in our transition from non-profit to charitable status.

Throughout our first 15 years, a volunteer board of directors led CIPO with chapter volunteers overseeing regional work. As our organization's mandate grew, in 2014, we hired our first Executive Director, Whitney Goulstone.

In celebration of our 25th anniversary, our organization began a months-long process to update our strategic plan and brand. The results give us a clear path forward and help us better communicate with our members, healthcare professionals and the wider public.

In October 2022, the Canadian Immunodeficiency Patient Organization unveiled its new name:



But while our name has changed, our purpose is still the same. Each day, we work to empower Canadians impacted by immunodeficiency disorders to live well through education, support, advocacy, community-building, and research.

ImmUnity Canada started modestly as a volunteer-run organization with patients and families nationwide giving their time to educate others and promote awareness of primary immunodeficiencies. Today, our volunteers and members continue to be the lifeblood of our organization and community. From the beginning, one message rings louder than the rest:

With the 2017 strategic plan expiring in February 2022, ImmUnity Canada began developing a new strategic plan for 2022-2027.

PI Patient

Vennie was born with x linked agammaglobulinemia that was diagnosed around 1 year old.

He had infusions once a month at SickKids and then St. Michaels in Toronto, until he moved to subcutaneous treatment during the pandemic, which he self administers it once a week.

He has been very susceptible to severe infections his entire life. So he has to be extra vigilant about any little scrape or cut that could lead to severe infections that in the past have led to being on crutches, extended hospital stays, and, in one case, surgery.

## Membership

ImmUnity Canada's membership was more active than ever! In 2022 members attended a variety of events, both online and in person, and continued to advocate for all patients with immunodeficiency in Canada. In total, we ended the year with a **958 members**— increasing by nearly 100 members since 2021.

As mentioned in the 2022 Annual Report, a growing, sustainable community is a goal for us moving forward. ### **Steering** Committees

Steering Committees continued to raise important issues of concern for the Primary Immunodeficiency communities across Canada to ImmUnity Canada. 18 chapter volunteers across Canada were involved in a review of the Steering Committee model, and made recommendations for national and provincial volunteering opportunities across Canada for 2023. The report was presented at the April 2023 national conference in Ottawa. Those based in British Columbia also contributed to the campaign to secure provincial newborn screening.

Steering Committee members met interested members at the virtual conference at "roundtables" to discuss issues relevant to their province. Steering Committee members contributed to running the national community groups too.

# Programs

### **Membership Survey**

In 2022, ImmUnity Canada kicked off its 25th year of existence by surveying its membership to understand more about their needs, how we could improve what we do for members, and understand more about the impact of our initiatives to date. 169 people responded, and comments helped inform the Strategic Plan 2022 - 2027 developed in April 2022.


We found that, since becoming members:

Over half of respondents said membership provided them a better support network than they had previously, and they they had begun advocating on behalf of the PI community. Another 41% said they started actively participating in activites with the purpose of improving the lives of others with PI.

Also in the survey, members mentioned that the most significant impact of joining ImmUnity Canada was feeling connected, increasing their knowledge and skills, and helping to improve the lives of others affected by PI.


### **Events**

Throughout the year, members across Canada continued to provide each other with support, as well as connect socially through monthly online meetups and in-person meetings to learn from one another. Provincial and regional members continued to meet each month to discuss issues which impacted them through our

Volunteer Steering Committees, which were integral to helping plan upcoming events in 2023.



In early 2022, the PI Educational Webinar series ended, and our first three-day virtual PI educational conference took place in September 2022 attended by 150 individuals. Patients and health care practitioners provided over 6 educational sessions. ImmUnity Canada continued to provide important updates to patients and their families with regards to COVID-19, and held our most popular online COVID-19 Q+A event with Dr. Bruce Ritchie.

From January to May 2022, our "Slice of PI" podcast- hosted by Paola Andrea Fernandez de Soto Abdul-Rahim- was listened to by hundreds of individuals. The podcast was considered a great way to explore the diverse experiences of people living with a PI through reflexive investigation of the social and emotional well-being of people living with these diseases.

Later in the year, feedback through over 80 interviews and focus group discussions led to

revisions in how members want to be connected socially and be supported by one another, and plans to improve the overall membership experience and volunteer experience as well as ensuring improvements were made to communications. ImmUnity Canada traveled to Vancouver, Toronto, Halifax and Edmonton and met with over 50 individuals, representing patients, families, health practitioners and industry to help plan to meet members immediate and longer-term needs.

During PI Awareness Week 2022, ImmUnity Canada launched their first national awareness "Walk for Immunodeficeincy" event, where over 103 individuals registered. Thanks to members walking in many parts of Canada to highlight the needs of living with an invisible disease, we were able to raise over \$10,000.



In addition, ImmUnity Canada hosted a special webinar looking at access to treatment globally, including how the Russia-Ukraine war affected PI patients in the conflict zone.


Our survey also found that, after members attended an Immunity Canada Event:

ImmUnity Canada represented the PI patient population during different consultations, working groups and committees affecting the community in 2022, including:

Policy

- The Request for Proposal for Immunoglobulin Products with Canadian Blood Services.
- Health Canada's Drugs for Rare Disease Strategy
- National Emergency Blood Management Committee IG Shortage Plan
- Canadian Blood Services IG Patient Forum

In October 2022 Executive Director, Whitney Goulstone, and Programs Manager, David Josey, represented Canada at the Global Patient Meeting in Gotenburg, Sweden. At the meeting, Whitney was voted on to the International Patient Organization for Primary Immunodeficiencies (IPOPI) board and is pleased to represent Canada's PI population on the global level.

#### **Newborn Screening**

After several years of continued advocacy work across the country to get Severe Combined Immune Deficiency (SCID) included on provincial newborn screening programs, much progress was made as British Columbia became the 9th province and the Yukon became the third territory to add SCID to their newborn screening panel.

As of September 2022, babies born in all provinces and territories except Newfoundland & Labrador are screened for SCID at birth.

In December 2022, ImmUnity Canada launched a joint initiative with the Network for Rare Blood Disorders Organization (NRBDO) for the creation of a national newborn screening program. Working with Health Canada within the framework of the Federal Drugs for Rare Disease program, ImmUnity Canada continues to work with the NRBDO and other stakeholders towards this goal.

Also in 2022, ImmUnity Canada created new programs to contribute to the ongoing development of the PI community. These included the following awards:

#### The Immunology Resident Research Award

The Immunology Research Award is intended to support a resident enrolled in a Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada (RCPSC) Clinical Immunology and Allergy residency training program, who is pursuing qualitative or translational research project at the field of immunology, at an academic centre in Canada, and whose research aligns with one or more of ImmUnity Canada's goals: improving patient care, patient education, patient support and advocacy. Candidates are expected to have a well-described research project that is feasible to complete within one year and

with potential to improve the quality of life of patients living with immunodeficiencies.

#### **Youth Higher Education Scholarships**

The Youth Higher Education Scholarships are intended to support youth (aged 17-25) currently enrolled in a recognized Canadian higher education program, and whose lives have been affected by immunodeficiency.

### Meet Kevin Lee

Research Grant Recipient

Kevin Lee is a recent graduate from the Adult Clinical Immunology and Allergy

program at the University of British Columbia. His clinical rotations with Dr. Biggs and Dr. Pourshahnazari at the Primary Immunodeficiency Transition Clinic furthered his appreciation for having a strong, patient-centered, transition-of-care clinic for individuals

with complex conditions. As such, he is excited to have the opportunity to advocate for individuals with primary immunodeficiency through the project titled, "Understanding the needs and barriers to care of adolescents and young adults with primary immunodeficiency (PID) in Canada".

The objective of the project is to describe the challenges faced by adolescents and young adults living with PID in accessing the adult healthcare system and how socioeconomic factors may influence this experience (e.g. social support, finances, food insecurity, housing insecurity). We also hope this will be an opportunity to generate innovative solutions to mitigate such barriers to care.

This will be completed through an online survey aimed at 18-35 year old individuals with PID living in Canada. The English version of the survey was launched as of Aug 2023 via REDCap\*, and we hope to launch a French version soon. The link was shared to ImmUnity Canada & Clinical Immunology Network-Canada (CINC) for dissemination. The grant is being used towards the REDCap survey, and to remunerate survey participants for their time (survey is estimated to take 30-45 minutes). Their team hopes to have some preliminary data by early Winter of 2023.

In 2022, the organization was fortunate enough to substantially increase its revenue by 39% through purposeful fundraising. This was achieved primarily through building on the ongoing exceptional quality and consistency of services and programs provided by the organization, as well as the areas identified in the strategic plan. In the strategic plan,

sustainability and funding were identified as priority areas to focus on going forward (2022-2027).

2022 saw our first government funding, with a successful Canada Summer Jobs Grant, as well as an increase in donations from three private foundations: the Foster Hewitt Foundation, the Lohn Family Foundation and the Loyal Protestant Association.


We also held our first fundraising event, the Walk for PI, in 2022, which saw a marked increase in individual donations.

Our 2022 financial statements were audited by Welch LLP, with bookkeeping services by BDO.




